

Welcome

The worship leader encourages members to welcome each other before explaining that the service will focus on Action for Children's work.

Story

Natasha*

Single mother Natasha was referred to Action for Children by her doctor because she was struggling to cope with her seven year old son Rory’s aggressive behaviour. Action for Children helped Natasha with advice to calm him. After getting to know her support worker better, Natasha expressed that she was also unable to cope with the rising cost of living. She was dreading Christmas, wondering how she would afford to heat the house or buy her children the presents they wanted.

Natasha’s 10-year-old daughter Rosie overheard her mother telling her auntie “I don’t know how I’m going to get through Christmas this year.”

Natasha realised this because her daughter’s Santa list was so short and included a food bowl for the family’s dog and a £25 Primark voucher. Rosie told her mum she knew she couldn’t afford Christmas this year and didn’t want to burden her.

“It just broke my heart,” said Natasha. “It really was heart breaking to think at 10 years of age, you’re worrying about these sorts of things.”

Action for Children was able to help by paying for heating oil, school uniforms and Asda gift cards to help through the Christmas period.

“Action for Children took so much pressure off me keeping the house warm for the kids when it was freezing last year, that really did take a huge amount of weight off my shoulders. I was able to make a really good Christmas dinner for the children – so Action for Children did make huge, huge impacts on our lives.”



But with money still very tight, Natasha says she’s “dreading” this Christmas. She believes Rosie isn’t telling her about things she needs to buy.

When asked what she wanted for Christmas, Rosie said, “Some oil so mummy doesn’t have to worry about keeping us warm while we’re home for the holidays.”

“Nobody knows what’s going to happen. Will we have enough money to put oil in the tank? Will we have enough money to go to the food shop? Will we have enough to keep the electricity going?”

While Natasha is approaching another Christmas with a worry about finances, she’s so grateful for the support of Action for Children, knowing that she can reach out and get a helping hand again this year if she needs it.

A Christmas reflection

The minister or worship leader may choose to share their reflections on Christmas, the theme and the Bible readings. Alternatively, read the reflection written below by Action for Children trustee, the Revd Mike Long.

The theme is 'The gift of joy'

There is enormous joy in the wonder of Christmas – in the promise of the angels, the accounts of shepherds and wise travellers, as well as the marvellous incarnation of Jesus Christ himself. Here, we see the love of God made real.

The angel brings surprising, fabulous news that will stir hearts and change lives, and a sign of this new beginning – of the reign of a Saviour – is the arrival of a vulnerable child in a stable. It was a wonderful and yet strange sign, one that directed attention to the child on the margins, to what was fragile rather than strong, to what was quite beyond the realm of ordinary expectation. This is hugely significant, for it inverts contemporary values and understandings: it places a weak and vulnerable child at the centre of God's purposes. This is what led shepherds into new discoveries of wonder and joy. It also signified the beginning of more positive attitudes and regard for children, seen in the coming years, among the followers of Jesus.

Action for Children has known that wonder and joy can be found in the unlikeliest of places. The Christmas story reminds us how the extraordinary is revealed in what might first appear as weak, neglected or marginalised. We know that in the most fragile of environments, and with the right support, security, happiness and opportunity can be found, and lives utterly transformed. We've seen this in our residential homes, our provision for disabled children, mental health programmes, advice services, short breaks, fostering support, and interventions among children exploited through organised crime networks.

There is joy in abundance when children are helped to make new discoveries, realise their potential, develop bonds of security and trust, and feel affirmed and supported.

There are many ways in which we can bring the joy of that first Christmas into the lives of others. In working for safe and happy childhoods, Action for Children is an important one of them.

So, like the shepherds, we can each of us keep watch this Christmas and be aware of the needs of others around us. Like the shepherds, we can each

of us believe in the joyful gift of Our Lord Jesus Christ and the example of his life and service to the most vulnerable. And like the shepherds, we can each of us act to bring joy to our communities.

Emily's story

After leaving an abusive relationship, mother of two Emily* received emotional support and a Christmas food and present hamper.

Mum of two and nurse Emily*, 42, was in an abusive relationship when she tried to take her own life on three separate occasions. Her ex-husband was not only abusive to her but to her seven-year-old sons from a previous relationship. Thankfully Action for Children stepped in to support Emily and her sons as she left the abusive relationship and navigated a new life with her boys.

As well as ongoing support, the family also received a Christmas hamper full of treats and presents that would normally be outside Emily's budget.

Parent Talk tips for a joyful Christmas

Christmas can bring joy, but it can also bring worry about finances. Our online service Parent Talk offers support for parents and carers across a broad range of areas, including creative ideas for celebrating Christmas on a budget.

Try some of the ideas below for keeping the costs down this Christmas:

- ★ Children don't need lots of expensive toys to be happy. A few thoughtful gifts and experiences will mean a lot.
- ★ When writing letters to Santa, encourage your children to talk about their wishes and hopes instead of focusing only on presents.
- ★ Try the four-gift rule: Something they want, something they need, something to wear and something to read. You could even ask your child to base their letter to Santa on this.
- ★ Facebook can be useful for finding free and pre-loved toys and games. Lots of neighbourhood groups or 'for sale' groups advertise free items that you can go and pick up. While the toys may not be brand new, they are new to your child – and that's what's exciting.
- ★ Arrange a book or toy swap with friends, where each child can swap an item for something different.
- ★ Look at experience gifts, like annual passes to family attractions. You could even create your own coupons for days out to a beach or museum.
- ★ Ask your child to help you make potato stamps ([bbcgoodfood.com/howto/guide/how-make-potato-stamps](https://www.bbcgoodfood.com/howto/guide/how-make-potato-stamps)) for homemade Christmas cards or wrapping paper.
- ★ Create your own salt dough decorations ([bbcgoodfood.com/howto/guide/salt-dough-christmas-decorations](https://www.bbcgoodfood.com/howto/guide/salt-dough-christmas-decorations)) to put on the tree and gift to friends and family.
- ★ Suggest a Secret Santa with friends and family, where you each have one person to buy for. It can help to set a budget and reduce the number of gifts you need to buy.
- ★ Make handmade or edible gifts. Try a recipe for chocolate bark or biscuits.
